Course Description: Principles of Economics-Macro. Scope and methodology of economics as a social science, the measurement of national income, the theory of national income determination, money and banking, monetary and fiscal policy, and international economics.

Course Objectives: To gain a fundamental understanding of the workings of the macro-economy; and to develop a basic understanding of the role that government has in influencing economic activity.

Course Policies

Academic Integrity: Students have the responsibility to know and observe the requirements of The UNC Charlotte Code of Student Academic Integrity. The normal penalty for a first offense is zero credit on the work involving dishonesty and further substantial reduction of the course grade. In almost all cases, the course grade is reduced to F. Copies of the code can be obtained from the Dean of Students Office. Standards of academic integrity will be enforced in this course. Students are expected to report cases of academic dishonesty to the course instructor.

Make-up work and late work: There are NO makeup exams, homeworks, quizzes, or participation points except for students away representing the university. If you miss an exam (due to illness, family emergency, car trouble, or any other reason besides representing the university), plan to count the zero grade as your lowest exam score (See Grade Calculation Summary below)

Inclement Weather: In the event of inclement weather that closes the university the day of a scheduled test, the test is automatically rescheduled for the next class meeting. Grading:

Please bring a calculator and at least (2) #2 pencils to every class as they will be required for taking exams and possibly pop quizzes.

Tests and Final Exam: There will be four regular exams (each counting 23% of final grade) and one *optional* cumulative final exam (see grade calculation). Exams will typically be comprised of multiple choice and/or true false answer questions but could also have some short answer or graphing questions. Students should be prepared for the exams by bringing (2) #2 pencils and a calculator (*cell phones are not allowed to be used as calculators during exams or quizzes, unless specifically announced by me*). Please note, students are not allowed to leave the classroom and return during an exam, so please take care of personal business before entering the room for the exam. Students who arrive late for a regular exam and/or the final examination will be permitted to take the exam provided that no student has turned in their paper prior to the student’s arrival. Once a paper has been turned in, late arriving students will not be permitted to begin the exam. A student who begins an exam late will not be given extra time at the end of the regular test or examination period.

Participation Points: YOU MUST HAVE YOUR PHONE OR DEVICE TO QUALIFY FOR MOST PARTICIPATION POINTS. Participation points consist of In-class Poll Everywhere questions and will make up 8% of your final grade. You will get one Class Participation Grade for each class based on the percentage of correct Poll Everywhere answers for that class. When determining your final Participation Points grade for the course, I will drop your (2) Lowest Poll Session scores

Homework: There will likely be no Homework assigned for this course.

Bonus Points: Bonus Points may (or may not) be offered and applied at the discretion of the instructor.

OPTIONAL Cumulative Final Exam

The Optional Final Exam will replace **EITHER** your lowest Regular Exam Grade **OR** your Participation Points grade, whichever helps you the most. If the Optional Final Exam grade is lower than all other grades, it will not count. Therefore, the Optional Final Exam **CANNOT HURT** your Final Course Grade.

In other words, your Final Grade will be determined by whichever of the following three calculations brings you the highest final grade:

Calculation #1: (Final Exam not taken or is lower than all other grades)

Final Grade = (Exam#1 grade X .23)+(Exam#2 grade X .23)+(Exam#3 grade X .23)+ (Exam#4 grade X .23)+(Participation grade X .08)

Calculation #2: (Final Exam replaces Participation grade)

Final Grade = (Exam#1 grade X .23)+(Exam#2 grade X .23)+(Exam#3 grade X .23)+(Exam#4 grade X .23)+(Cumulative Final Exam grade X .08)

Calculation #3: (Final Exam replaces lowest Regular Exam grade)

Final Grade = (Highest Regular Exam grade X .23) + (2nd Highest Regular Exam grade X .23) + (3rd Highest Regular Exam grade X .23) + (Participation grade X .08) + (Cumulative Final Exam grade X .23)

Incomplete Grades (I): A grade of Incomplete (I) may be given only under a strict definition of circumstances. A grade of (I) is reserved solely for instances where a student **who is otherwise passing the course**, cannot complete the assignments of the course **due to circumstances beyond his/her control**. This grade is rarely allowed and only with full and complete documentation of the circumstances.

Note-taking Suggestions: Note-taking is important to the active learning process. Most lecturing will be delivered using overhead projector presentations. To assist in efficient student note-taking, certain note-taking guide slides for each lecture will be posted on Canvas by 5 pm on the Tuesday prior to each class. **Be sure to check Canvas and email between 5 pm on Tuesdays and class time each week.** Suggestions from previous students include printing those slides using 3-hole punch printer paper and using a 3 ring binder to organize them with your lecture notes. Of course this is optional and you should use whatever note organizing system works best for you.
